Green County Public Health is a leader in enhancing and promoting health through education, outreach, and partnership.

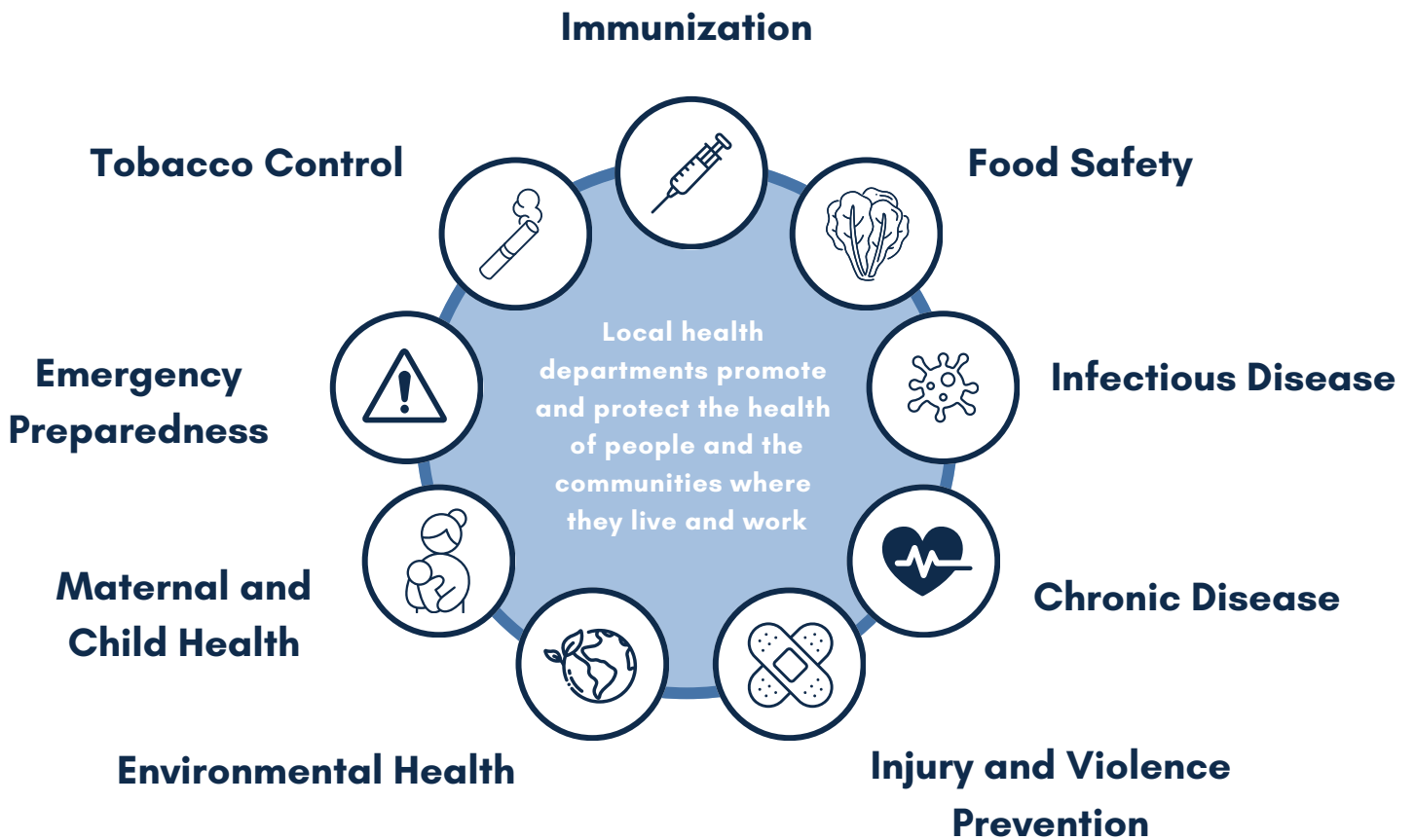
Vision

What is public health?

Public health is more than just the work of a local health department. Public health refers to the overall health and well-being of a community and all of the people and organizations working towards making that community a healthier and safer place to live, work, and learn. Lots of organizations do public health-related work, such as organizations focused on homelessness, mental health, clean water, or education. All of these things contribute to the health of an individual and the health of a community.

Public health departments exist to help lead and coordinate efforts to protect and promote health and prevent disease and injury. Public health departments work closely with other community organizations to do this work because we are stronger when we work together and can combine our resources to have a greater impact on health.



Foundational Public Health Services

The Foundational Public Health Services model defines the minimum services and capabilities that all public health departments should have. This framework was recently updated in 2022 to reflect the growth and changes of modern public health departments. Green County Public Health strives to meet these expectations. **This year, our annual report is organized around the Foundational Services model.** The Foundational Public Health Services come from the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB), a national organization that accredits public health departments and helps set standards and recommendations for the field.

Assessment & Surveillance

2024 Community Health Assessment (CHA)

Every three years, Green County Public Health co-leads the Green County Community Health Assessment with SSM Health Monroe Hospital. We work as a part of the Green County Healthy Community Coalition (GCHCC), which Green County Public Health co-chairs, to complete the assessment. In 2024, we underwent the most recent assessment to learn about the community's health needs. We conducted a community health survey and received over 1,500 responses, hosted four community conversations with small groups of community members, and interviewed thirteen community leaders. In addition to gathering input from community members, we also gathered secondary data on the health of Green County.

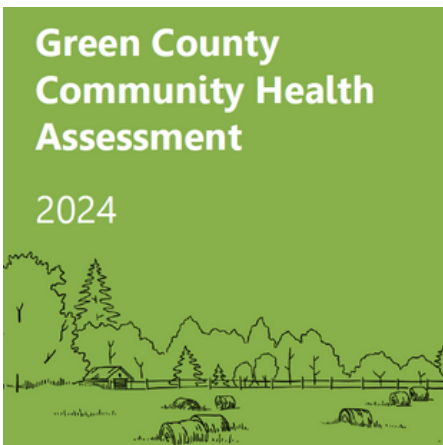


After the assessment was complete, we presented the results to coalition members, and we worked together to identify which health issues the community should focus on. The coalition selected **Mental Health** and **Housing** as the two health issues to address over the next three years. These two issues were recurring themes that came up during the community health assessment while talking with community members and in the data.

After completing the assessment and selecting priorities, the coalition began working on a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). This plan will outline goals, objectives and activities for the community to take action to improve health in Green County.

Community Partnership Development

Coalitions

Green County Public Health is a member of numerous coalitions, workgroups, and committees that allow us to collaborate with other organizations in Green County. In 2024, Green County Public Health worked with UW Madison Division of Extension—Green County, the Green County Zoning Department, and Green County Land and Water Conservation to form the Green County Water Quality Coalition. The purpose of this group is to intentionally and effectively collaborate to increase understanding of Green County groundwater quality and take action for water stewardship so we have healthy waters for current and future generations.

Partnership with Libraries

In September, Green County Public Health staff met with five local libraries to deliver “Tick Removal Kits” to community members. These kits help prevent people from contracting tick-borne diseases. As a result of meeting with libraries and working on this program together, our department was able to offer additional presentations and programs in partnership with libraries in Green County.

Open House

In April, Green County Public Health hosted an Open House in honor of National Public Health Week. This event featured a mini health fair highlighting our programs and services, tours of our office, refreshments, and giveaways. This event allowed our partners and community members to learn more about public health, who we are and what we do. In 2024, we had over 20 people attend the Open House.

Hosting UW Chancellor Mnookin

The University of Wisconsin–Madison Chancellor, Jennifer Mnookin, visited Green County Public Health in September. We hosted the Chancellor and members of the Green County Healthy Community Coalition to highlight the partnerships between the coalition and UW-Madison’s *UniverCity* program in 2019. This partnership brought UW-Madison students to Green County who worked on various health-related projects and resulted in the development of new jobs and programs that support health in Green County.

Health Equity

Some communities experience poorer health due to outside influences like discrimination, inability to access services or other reasons. Green County Public Health works towards making a community in which everyone can be healthy. In 2024, our staff was a part of planning and coordinating the first annual FERIA De Salud Latina, a health fair geared towards Spanish-speaking community members. Over 380 people attended the event; Green County Public Health administered vaccines and worked with Safe Kids South Central to provide education on child passenger safety and offered car seat check appointments.



Emergency Preparedness & Response

Green County Public Health writes plans and participates in training and practice exercises to prepare for public health emergencies. Preparing for events like pandemics, tornadoes, floods, and other emergencies that might impact the public’s health allows us to respond better to those events if they do happen. In 2024, our team participated in four practice exercises with other local organizations. These exercise scenarios included mass vaccination clinics, power outage, medical surge, and family reception/shelter.



Our department also educates community members about the importance of preparing for emergencies and in 2024, we started an Emergency Preparedness newsletter that we publish quarterly. This newsletter was the result of working with older adults and senior living apartments in Green County to learn how we could improve communication with elderly residents in Green County.

Strategic Plan

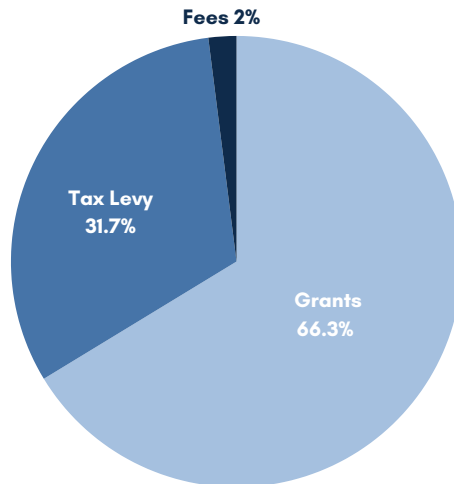
At the start of 2024, we implemented our 2024-2027 Strategic Plan, which we developed in 2023. The plan has two priority areas: **Community Focus & Partnership Development** and **Workforce & Organizational Competencies**. During the first year of implementing this plan, our department achieved several of the objectives we set, and completed numerous strategies.

 Green County Public Health engaged with over five new partner organizations across the community.

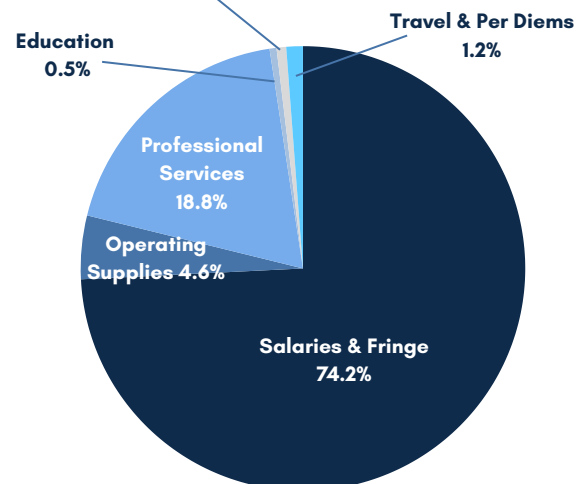
Financial Accountability

We implemented a new wage structure in July of 2024 and our budget was able to accommodate the changes without requiring the addition of extra tax levy. We continue to bill Medicaid for the Prenatal Care Coordination program as well as lead testing and vaccinations.

Policy Development & Support

Green County Public Health recognizes the importance of policies that protect and improve the health of Green County residents. In 2024, GCPH staff attended two municipal meetings and spoke at one meeting to address the value of community water fluoridation to the public's health. Additionally, the Green County Board of Health issued a statement that was sent to all municipal clerks in Green County. The Board of Health's statement supported the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, Division of Public Health's Community Water Fluoridation statement.



Accountability & Performance Management

Local Health Departments (LHDs) are now required by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to have a Performance Management Plan. GCPH wrote into our 2024-2027 Strategic Plan that our department would implement a performance management system before April 2025. We achieved this goal early, and in July 2024, our team underwent training to learn more about performance management and to work with an expert to develop a system, plan, and performance measures for our department. Our performance management plan was approved by the Green County Board of Health in November 2024. This plan will help our department track our successes, identify areas for improvement, and remain accountable to the community.

Communications





Community Education

Each year, Green County Public Health attends several community events and speaks with many community organizations. These opportunities allow our department to talk with community members about the programs and services we offer and provide education on various public health topics. The types of events our staff attended in 2024 included health fairs, farmers markets, child development days, coalition meetings, and more. We also provided educational presentations in schools and at healthcare facilities. In 2024, we also had several students of various levels of study visit our office to job shadow our staff.

Social Media & Marketing

Green County Public Health uses social and traditional media to share important information with the community and to ensure community members are aware of our services. During 2024, we posted on social media, published monthly press releases, participated in monthly radio interviews, and published an article in The Monroe Times each month. In 2024, we also launched two paid advertising campaigns, which included digital billboards, radio advertisements, and newspaper advertisements. One campaign was focused on promoting the 2024 Community Health Assessment, and the other was focused on increasing well water testing in Green County; more information on this campaign is available on page 17.

Communicable Disease Control

Disease Investigation & Surveillance

Communicable diseases are illnesses caused by viruses, bacteria, and parasites that can be spread from person to person or animal to person. Surveillance, investigation, and follow-up of reportable communicable diseases are state-mandated activities for local health departments. These activities allow public health professionals to help prevent further spread of these diseases. In 2024, 265 reportable diseases were investigated; Chlamydia cases had the largest decrease of cases, from 93 in 2023 to 69 cases in 2024. Our staff administered 80 tuberculin skin tests, an increase from 50 tuberculin skin tests in 2023. Three clients received latent (non-infectious) TB treatment through Green County Public Health, which consisted of weekly visits for 12 weeks to provide directly observed therapy. New in 2024, we began distributing free condoms in the Public Health Vending Machine outside the Green County Government Services Building.

Immunization Program

Green County Public Health strives to reduce or eliminate vaccine-preventable diseases through the administration of vaccines. Most immunizations are given by appointment at our office. Each fall, Public Health staff work with Green County school districts to offer influenza vaccines at schools; in 2024, we administered 313 flu vaccines to local students.

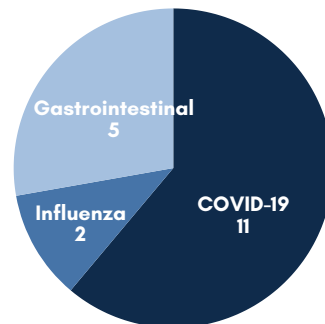

Rabies Program

In collaboration with law enforcement and veterinarians, our Public Health Nurses followed up on 71 animal bite orders in 2024 and submitted 17 animal specimens for Rabies testing to the WI State Lab of Hygiene. All specimens tested negative for rabies. Our department issued 5 domestic and/or livestock quarantine orders throughout the year. We also transitioned all Rabies Control Program record-keeping to the WI Electronic Disease Syndromic Surveillance System, which improved our efficiency and reporting capabilities.

Fatality Review Team (Formerly *Keeping Kids Alive*)

Since 2013, Green County Public Health has coordinated the Keeping Kids Alive program under the guidance of the Children’s Health Alliance of Wisconsin. This multidisciplinary team consists of members from local human services, public health, coroner, district attorney, law enforcement, health care, and schools. This team strives to learn from the tragedy in order to prevent a death from happening again. In 2024, this group received additional training to conduct overdose fatality reviews and changed the name to Fatality Review Team. The group met and reviewed 3 children’s deaths and 1 overdose death. This group seeks to understand the risk factors and circumstances surrounding the death. The team then makes recommendations to help prevent future fatalities.

Tobacco Prevention

Green County Public Health has remained active in tobacco and vaping prevention and cessation work. Much of our tobacco prevention work in 2024 was on preventing vaping use among youth. Vapes contain nicotine along with other chemicals that impact brain growth and development as well as negatively impact physical and mental health. Recent surveys indicate that 50% of teens who vape want to quit. In 2024, Green County Public Health did educational vaping presentations for elementary, middle, and high school students. At Green County Rural Safety Day in September, a total of 374 5th-grade students from six school districts received vaping education.

Delta 8

Green County Public Health continued the work it began in 2023 with community partners to address the emerging public health concerns with Delta-8. Delta-8 is a synthetic form of THC (marijuana). Our department coordinates a task force with partners from Law Enforcement, Behavioral Health, SSM Monroe, Better Brodhead, F.A.I.T.H. Addiction Awareness, and Public Health to continue to address Delta-8 availability to youth in the community, which can cause the potential for harm.

Chronic Disease & Injury Prevention

Safe Kids South Central

In 2024, Green County Public Health joined the Dane County Madison Area Safe Kids, which was renamed Safe Kids South Central. This partnership has allowed us to provide additional educational resources to the public. Coalition members attended the Feria De Salud Latina to offer education and information on car seat safety and provided our department with a car seat safety display to use at future events.



Child Passenger Safety Program

Green County Public Health’s Child Passenger Safety Technician (CPST) increased the number of child seat safety checks by 26% from 2023 to 2024. Of those seats checked, 80% were being misused and were corrected. Our CPST also provided car seat safety information sessions with Early Head Start Green County and SSM Health Monroe Family Birth staff.

Fit Families

The Fit Families program is a behavior change program that helps families with children ages 2-4 adopt healthier eating and exercise habits. Families choose a nutrition or physical activity goal and receive monthly support and education from a Fit Families coach to help them achieve it. These coaches also participate in the Green County Healthy Communities Coalition to support healthy food and physical activity choices throughout the community.

Early Head Start Home Visiting

In 2024, Green County Public Health continued our partnership with Reach Green Early Head Start to provide home visits to over 26 families from a Public Health Nurse. The nurse was able to provide education, explore barriers, and help coordinate well-child visits, dental appointments, recommended vaccinations, and other health-related topics. Early Head Start resumed “Dental Days” in March 2024 to meet children’s need to have their first dental appointment at age 1.



Prenatal Care Coordination (PNCC)

Green County Public Health provides access to medical, social, and educational services to pregnant women who are considered high-risk through the Prenatal Care Coordination Program (PNCC). PNCC is a Medical Assistance benefit for at-risk pregnant women. Public Health Nurses meet with pregnant and postpartum women monthly until they are 2 months postpartum. The program includes physical and emotional assessments, care plan development, ongoing care coordination, health education, and nutrition counseling. In 2024, eight women received PNCC services. They received 32 face-to-face visits, which is an increase from 18 visits in 2023.

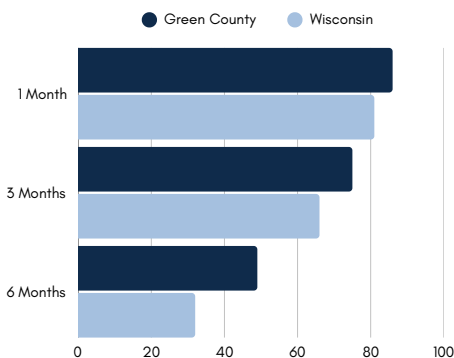
Women, Infants & Children (WIC)

The Green County Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) program is a resource for eligible families to help ensure they are getting adequate nutrition and information about healthy eating. The program served the highest number of children (ages 1-4) in the past 5 years, indicating that families value the services and remain enrolled for longer durations. The program issued \$11,000 worth of vouchers to WIC families through the **Farmers Market Nutrition Program**, allowing them to buy fresh produce directly from local farmers. This was a significant increase from the \$3,750 worth of vouchers issued in 2023.

Technology improvements were made in 2024, including the implementation of an electronic portal in Wisconsin for easier document submission during remote WIC enrollment visits. Our county also introduced an online nutrition education program, offering families the flexibility to complete some of their nutrition education online at their convenience.

Breastfeeding

Breastfeeding support and education are offered through the public health department, WIC, and the WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counseling Program. In 2024, 78% of Green County WIC postpartum participants initiated breastfeeding, and breastfeeding rates for Green County WIC moms have continuously remained higher than the state average. The Green County WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counselor made 398 contacts with pregnant and breastfeeding WIC participants in 2024. Breastfeeding contributes to less illness and lower health care costs for breastfeeding mothers and breastfed babies.

Green County Breastfeeding Collaborative (BFC)

This group is led by Green County Public Health in partnership with SSM Health Monroe, Reach Green Early Head Start, and Stephenson County Health Department celebrated its 10th year in operation in 2024. In August, the group celebrated National Breastfeeding Month with the Our Community Grows by Supporting Breastfeeding Campaign, which included social media posts, radio interviews, and newspaper articles. The campaign also featured a display in the Government Services Building with personal breastfeeding anecdotes from community members. The newly revised Green County Breastfeeding Friendly Employer Toolkit was released and dispersed to employers in Green County in 2024.



Environmental Public Health

Radon Testing

In 2024, 98 free radon kits were distributed to residents, and 89 kits were tested and reported. Green County homes have a relatively high incidence of radon that exceeds health standards. Of the homes tested in 2024, 67% resulted in levels that exceeded health standards. Homes with high radon levels can usually be restored to safe levels with a radon removal system installed by a certified contractor.

Well Water Testing

Private well owners are responsible for testing their own water, unlike individuals who have municipal water, which is tested for health and safety by the municipality. In 2024, our department distributed 127 water test kits, and 79 of these kits were used. Of the wells tested, 18% showed nitrate levels that exceeded health standards.

Transient Non-Community (TNC) Water Systems

TNC wells are those that serve 25 or more different people at least 60 days of the year (eg. rural churches, taverns, wineries, or golf courses). There are 35 TNC water systems in Green County, and GCPH works with these establishments to test their water to ensure health and safety. Two of these sites have nitrate levels that exceed the standard and are pursuing grant funds to help reduce nitrate levels.

Lead Poisoning Prevention

In 2024, 21 children in Green County had elevated levels of lead of 5ug/dl or greater in their blood. Green County Public Health works with families to prevent further lead exposure and refer eligible families to the Lead Safe Homes (LSH) Program, which can remediate lead hazards in a home. One LSH project was completed in 2024, and two more homes are in the application process.

Environmental Health Tracking Grant

In 2023, Green County Public Health received a grant from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to increase well water testing in Green County and to encourage private well owners to apply for well compensation grant funds from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to replace or repair their well. Green County Public Health worked with UW Extension Green County, Green County Land and Water Conservation, and the DNR to develop messaging for an educational marketing campaign to promote private well water testing. We rolled out this campaign throughout 2024.



Human Health Hazards

In 2024, 8 human health reports were sent to GCPH, none of which revealed active human health hazards; rather, each complaint turned out to be a nuisance, and they were directed to the appropriate department.

Access to and Linkage with Clinical Care

Blood Pressure Checks

Green County Public Health offers free blood pressure checks for residents. In 2024, we took this service on the road and offered blood pressure checks at the Monroe Senior Center during American Heart Month in February. There were 48 blood pressure checks provided throughout the year.



Community Resource Guide

Our department created and maintains a comprehensive listing of several community resources called the Green County Community Resource Guide. Resource topics range from housing to mental health to education and beyond. In 2024, we gave out hundreds of copies of the guide in English and Spanish.

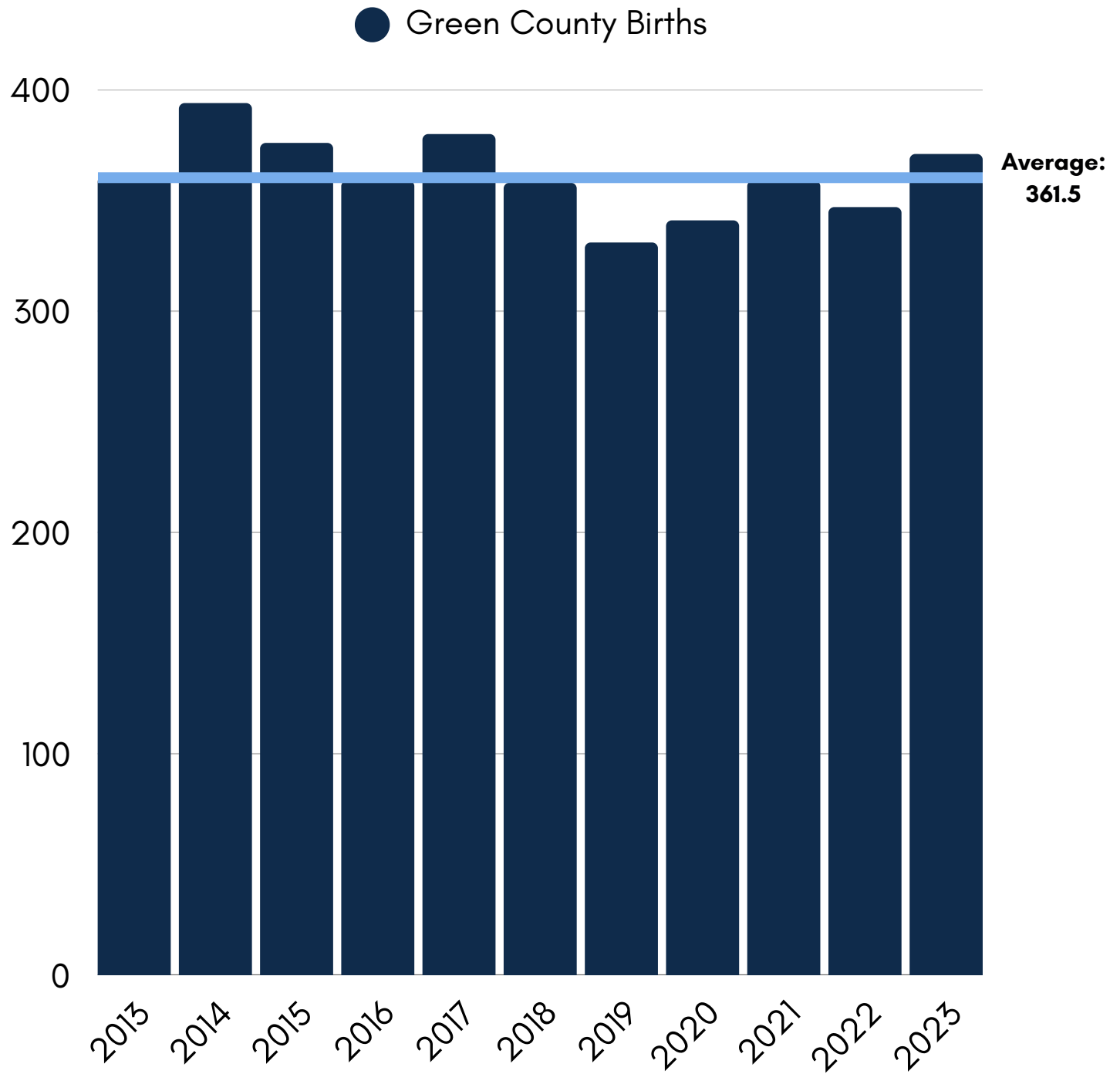
